Funded by a grant from the Elm Grove Junior Guild, approximately 40 goats, large, small, multi-colored, and definitely lively, arrived at Elm Grove Village Park on the afternoon of Monday, May 23, hopped out of their large transport trailer, and went immediately to work chewing the leaves of invasive Buckthorn to help

manage its spread.

The Village of Elm Grove and its Beautification Committee invited the Grazing Goats of Whitewater https:// www.grazinggoatswisconsin.com to feed initially on a 1 acre area on the east side of the park and pond for several days. The animals were penned in a solar-powered electric fence that could be moved as portions of the land were cleared.

Facts about "goat grazing" provided by the Committee include: "Goats work quickly because are always hungry. Their job is to eat and they do it very efficiently. They work quietly because they are mostly chewing. The goats leave behind valuable pre-pelleted droppings that serve as composting fertilizer that benefits plants. The goat crew is a more environmentally safe alternative over more traditional methods of cutting and treating invasive species with chemicals."

Elm Grove Boy Finds 250 Million-Year-Old Fossil in Backyard

"My son Miles McFadden was helping his dad with yard work on Mother's Day, May 8th, 2022, when an interesting rock (weighing in at 4.2 lbs.) caught his attention," wrote his mother, Emily McFadden, in an e-mail to The News-Independent.

"Miles", she noted "is enthusiastic about science - particularly geology and paleontology - so he knew he found a fossil. Working together with me and the internet, we formed a hypothesis that it was a Trilobite. After sharing photos with multiple geologists, it has been confirmed that this small impression is that of a Trilobite."

Trilobites were a group of crab-like animals with hard exoskeletons and a three-lobe body. They are marine animals that have been extinct for over 250,000,000 years, according to The Wisconsin Geological and Natural History Survey.

Miles, a kindergartner at Tonawanda, is understandably excited about finding a fossil from Pangea in his own backyard. "This creature was around 100 million years before T-Rex. I wonder what else is in my backyard," he said.

"Miles's previous paleontological finds at our Elm Grove home on Marquette Avenue include a rabbit skeleton," Emily said, so additional finds may be just outside his door.

And what does Miles plan to do with his latest discovery? "If any museum wants to display it, that'd be great. If not, I'll probably put it in my room," Miles explained.

"I'm proud of him. I hope his curiosity for our natural world continues to grow,' said Emily. "I'm certain there will be a lot more mud and rocks in our future.'

June 20-26 is Pollinator Week

How to Address Mosquitos, Protect Pollinators

(ELM GROVE) Looking for a simple and effective way to target mosquitoes in your yard? Chances are that what you have been doing may also be negatively impacting important pollinators.

Traditional mosquito control practices target the insects at the adult stage by periodically spraying with high concentrations of insecticides that kill all insects, not just mosquitos. That results in a loss of beneficial insects, such as bees and butterflies and their larva. Insects are at the base of the food web; and without them, birds and other creatures that rely on insects as food are challenged to find enough food for themselves and their young. When sprayed insects are eaten, the insecticide can build up in predators and affect their health.

The Elm Grove Beautification Committee suggests this simple, safe and effective alternative approach that targets mosquitos at the larval stage:

- Fill a five-gallon bucket halfway with water, and place it in a sunny place in your
- Add about 3-4 handfuls of hay or straw to the bucket. After a few days, the resulting brew is irresistible to gravid (egg-filled) female mosquitos.

- * After the mosquitos have laid their eggs, add a commercially available Mosquito Dunk tablet that contains Bacillus thuringiensis (Bt), a natural larvicide, to your bucket. The eggs will hatch and the larvae will die. The Mosquito Dunk that is added has a biological bacterial control that ONLY affects mosquitos.
- * After a few days, you can strain out the old organic matter and Mosquito Dunk (if there is any obvious solid left) and toss the organic matter into your compost pile or trash.

With this approach, you control mosquitos - and only mosquitos - without the use of harmful insecticides.

Purchasing a Mosquito Dunk

*Sunday, June 26, 11 a.m. to Noon at the Village Park's Monarch Waystation located near the pond's boat launch.

Village Update

On Tuesday, May 31, 2022, (5-31-22) residents are invited to gather in Village Park and celebrate Elm Grove Zip Code Day. The Beer Garden will be open, there will be food, music, activities for children and adults.


Village residents are in for a nice surprise when the Swimming Pool opens on Saturday, June 4th. The changing rooms and restrooms have new partitions, new lighting, new flooring, and benches. New showers, along with "No Touch" soap dispensers, hand dryers and flushers have been installed. Power washing, steam cleaning of all interior surfaces along with fresh paint brightens all areas of the building.

I am sure everyone has noticed that "road construction season" is in full swing in Wisconsin now, and in Elm Grove we will be paving Watertown Plank Road from Highland to Pilgrim and paving a new pathway along the east side of Elm Grove Road between Watertown Plank Road and Juneau Boulevard. Patching of roads will also be performed in numerous areas.

Many Village residents have joined the "No Mow May" effort to support pollinators. Allowing all or part of your yard to grow and remain herbicide, pesticide, and fertilizer free will provide food sources for early emerging bee species. Typical lawn floral species, including importantly dandelions, can help feed the more than 30 bee species present in our area and other arthropods. For those who aren't fond of bugs please remember that these pollinators are themselves a critical food source for young songbirds. Lack of habitat providing food, impacts of insecticides and cats are the leading causes of the huge decline in bird species.

The Village Board held a productive Committee of the Whole meeting on May 18th to discuss the status of proposed projects and issues.

- New Trustees were briefed on plans to "Daylight Underwood Creek" through the Park & Shop area to complete the Flood Control Project begun in 2005. The Village has received \$500,000 in grants and continues to apply for additional grants. Most recent estimates anticipate costs of about \$4.5 million. Current plans assume the start of construction in 2023 and completion in 2024. In addition to seeking additional grants, state and federal permits are needed.
- The Board members also discussed options to improve the state of Village roads. Current plans endorsed by the Public Works Committee outline \$10 million in road work over the next 10 years.
- President Palmer outlined a proposal to form an Ad Hoc Committee on EMS and Fire Service to evaluate options on how to continue providing these critical services. All Board members spoke of the importance of this effort.
- The Board also discussed how the requirement to hold referendum elections for any public works project expenditure of \$1million or more. All public works projects go through a process of review which includes early cost estimates and initial design. If the Village Board decides to continue to move a project forward more specific engineering and pricing are developed. The variance in



pricing makes it important to recognize that possible need for a referendum. A possible referendum itself has its own schedule needed to draft and approve referendum language and the required 75-day notice to the County for ballot preparation. In addition, the Board recognized the importance of providing resources and time to inform residents of the proposed referendum projects.

Mandel Development reports that work is proceeding to develop construction plans, contractor bid packages, and financing for redevelopment of the School Sisters of Notre Dame campus. Notre Dame Hall and Maria Hall will be restored and preserved, and demolition of the other "newer" buildings is projected to begin in early Fall of 2022 with construction of new buildings following.

The Village Board unanimously supported a proclamation to celebrate **National Pollinator Week during June 20**th **through 26**th, **2022**. The Proclamation recognizes the importance of all pollinators in maintaining healthy and biodiverse ecosystems. The Village seeks manage Village lands and habitats in a sustainable manner and to encourage property owners to do the same.

The Proclamation, dated and signed May 23, 2022, states:

"WHEREAS, pollinators such as thousands of species of bees, are essential partners in producing much of our food supply; and

WHEREAS, pollinators provide significant environmental benefits that are necessary for maintaining healthy, diverse ecosystems in towns and cities; and

WHEREAS, pollination plays a vital role for the trees and plants of our community, enhancing our quality of life and creating recreational and economic development opportunities; and

WHEREAS, the Village of Elm Grove manages parks, public landscaping and other public lands that may include greenways and wildlife habitats; and

WHEREAS, the Village of Elm Grove provides recommendations to developers and residents regarding landscaping to promote wise conservation stewardship, including the protection of pollinators and maintenance of their habitats;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Neil Palmer, Village President of Elm Grove, do hereby proclaim the 20th through the 26th of June, 2022 as our Village's observance of National Pollinator Week, and, as Elm Grove is an affiliate of Bee City USA, so urge all citizens to recognize this observance.

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Our History:

Remembrances of Things Past

WHATZZIT?

This "Whatzzit?" will be easy for many readers to quickly identify, but might be a bit more difficult for some younger folks who are not model railroad buffs. It's a Soo Line caboose, parked on the railroad siding that once crossed the entrance to the Elm Grove Public Works yards and dump at the end of Wall Street.

At once time, a caboose would announce the end of nearly every freight train as it passed. It served as a rolling work station for railroad crews and also could transport company personnel to a work site. There were about 35,000 of them rolling down American rails in the 1920s and 1930s, and about 20,000 were still in use in 1970. By the early 1990s, however, people began to notice that fewer freight trains still included them. As older cabooses were retired, the cost of constructing new ones had risen to about \$80,000 apiece.

In a time of changing technology, railroads determined that maintaining a "rolling work station" was no longer

necessary for their employees. So, as a cost-saving measure, the old railroad caboose was to be phased out. Nowadays, outside of railroad museums, a caboose is seldom seen in action on the tracks.

As for the Soo Line railroad, the company, founded in 1961, was absorbed as a subsidiary of the Canadian Pacific (CP) Railway in 1990. The remaining functional Soo Line rolling stock was systematically repainted, replacing the old Soo Line red-and-white colors with the CO logo and paint scheme. Older cars were sold off or sent to the scrap heap.

The photo shown above was taken during the summer of 2009 as a work crew was engaged in removing the siding and crossing. The caboose was employed as a work station for the project. By that fall, both the Caboose and the siding were gone.

PPMS Student Wins Top Honors in NCSC's 2022 Civics Education Essay Contest

(WILLIAMSBURG, VA) -- Kelsey Raddemann, a seventh grader at Pilgrim Park Middle School, took top honors in the National Center for State Courts' (NCSC) 2022 Civics Education Essay Contest.

In explaining which amendment in the U.S. Constitution has had the most impact in people's lives, an overwhelming number of students cited the First Amendment – with the 13th Amendment as a popular choice among younger contestants.

"NCSC's Civics Education Essay Contest is designed to encourage students to really think about the importance of our system of government and the framework on which it was founded," said NCSC President Mary C. McQueen.

Students from 49 states, the District of Columbia, and 19 countries participated in this year's contest. Essays were judged on creativity, accuracy, length and grammar. The nine winners will receive cash prizes totaling \$3,000.

Essays were judged by a team of NCSC staff and a finalist panel including NCSC Board Chair and Rhode Island Chief Justice **Paul A. Suttell** and **Mason Farr** of the Ohio Supreme Court's Civic Education Section and recipient of the 2021 Sandra Day O'Connor Award for the Advancement of Civics Education.


Elm Grove Girl Wins Music Awards

EGWC Art Scholarships Announced



The "Birders of the Grove" met on Saturday morning, May 14, 2022, for the second annual Birdathon celebration at Elm Grove Village Park. Participants checked in at our station set up by the group of bird feeders outside the library entrance. Bird species check lists were provided to the walkers, as well as additional information about our "High Flyer" Bird City efforts in Elm Grove. We had a raffle for participants with a cottage style bird feeder as the prize – our excited winner was a nine-year-old village resident!

We were very lucky to have ideal spring weather for our bird watching walk. Included in our park sightings were numerous redwinged blackbirds, several yellow warblers, Canada geese, and a red-tailed hawk with a nest high in the trees. Our team participants continued their counts in their own backyards and other venues. Overall, the total number of birds seen by our team was 250, with a species count of 51! Our most notable sightings were a red-eyed vireo, a tiny new sandhill crane with its parents, a scarlet tanager, a rubycrowned kinglet, 11 Baltimore orioles, 8 ruby throated hummingbirds, an eastern bluebird, and a cedar waxwing.



Our team is delighted to have exceeded our fundraising goal for this event; this will enable us to continue educating village residents about bird protection efforts and provide funding for Bird City projects in our community. 
- 1. Currently, due to the pandemic and other disruptions, the United States is under a state of EMERGENCY with blood supplies often having less than a single day's inventory.
- 2. Blood and blood products cannot be created or imitated in a lab. Human donors are the ONLY way these lifesaving infusions can happen.
- 3. A single transplant operation can use more than 50 individual units of blood. This is the equivalent of an entire large-scale blood drive
- 4. Cancer patients often get platelet infusions during treatment. Platelets are one of the components derived from a whole blood donation.
- 5. Trauma patients, birthing mothers, and surgery patients may receive red blood cell transfusions to save their lives in emergency situations. This is one of the three components of a whole blood donation.

Elmbrook Rotary Club has sent teams The school was built five years later. It to Guatemala in February of every year since 2012 to work with Common Hope. Common Hope is a St. Paul-based NGO, offering housing, medical, social, and educational services. In 2021 and 2022 the trips were cancelled due to the global pandemic. Because the clients whom Common Hope serves are largely unvaccinated, one way to continue helping has been remotely via Zoom and email.

In 2021 Elmbrook Rotary (assisted by a grant from Rotary International District 6270) provided books, supplemental materials, desks, and supplies for students in the remote village of San Miguel Milpas Altas. The school was experiencing high failure rates. This year the aid was focused on the New Hope community near Guatemala City, founded 21 years ago by Common Hope after a disastrous mudslide.

Legal Issues

Estate Planning and Remarriage

Marriage is a time for celebration. However, in the event of a remarriage, it is imperative that you and your future spouse also focus on the less romantic process of redrafting your estate plans. Wisconsin is a Marital Property state, which means your marriage will affect the ownership of all of your assets, regardless of how the asset is titled. This change in ownership will affect not only the division of your assets in the event of a divorce, but also the distribution of your assets upon your death. In many instances it will result in a distribution that is substantially different from what you intended.

You and your future spouse's respective financial situations and family situations are most likely more complex than when you first married. You probably have more assets and one or both of you may have children from previous relationships. It may, therefore, be in both parties' interest to execute a prenuptial agreement. In deciding whether or not a prenuptial agreement is appropriate, you and your future spouse should address the following issues:

1. How do the two of you plan to share, or not share, your income and expenses? Do either of you have any significant liabilities

for which the other should not be held liable? Health care costs and the cost of long-term care should be a significant part of this discussion.

- 2. In the event of a divorce, how do you want your assets divided? Do either of you have strong feelings about keeping any assets as your "individual" property in the event of a divorce?
- 3. In the event of your death, how do you want your property to be divided between your surviving spouse and your children? Do you want the majority, if not all, of the assets going to your surviving spouse? Or do you want your children or other family members receiving a significant share? These are the most significant issues that must be addressed and are also the factors which will determine whether or not a prenuptial agreement is needed. Once these issues have been addressed and, if necessary, a prenuptial agreement has been signed, the rest of your estate planning documents, (Wills, Revocable Trusts, Powers of Attorney, etc.) should be updated to reflect both your decisions and your new marriage.

National Merit Award Recipients Announced


