


From the Field by Dr. David Gaus

Humans aren't the only ones who get fatigued with age. Over time, medical equipment grows weary as well.

Our two hospitals are equipped with medical equipment we received, in some cases, almost 20 years ago, and it was used before it got to us. The good news is that much of our equipment has long outlived the useful lifespan we had hoped for, thanks to the diligence and talent of our Ecuadorian engineers. Somehow, they continually find creative ways to keep the equipment working.

For example, we received our X-ray machine at Hospital PVM in 1999 from a hospital in Milwaukee. It had been retired (and was already pretty tired), yet it still works! I can't begin to tell



These used machines constitute much of the driving force behind our ability to make great medical care affordable to so many marginalized communities. If not for this equipment, "self-sustainability" would have been a dream at best. But as Hesburgh Hospital continues to operate near capacity, we have created a real stress on these old machines, and we would like to replace or add to what we have. Some of these items are failing and others are close. We would prefer to make these purchases and replace them now before they fail, and we find ourselves in a situation where we must pay higher prices for essential equipment.

A medical supply facility in the U.S. showed us what we hoped for: quality, used equipment for a fraction of the price we could find in the used Ecuadorian market, and certainly much cheaper than what we would pay for new machines. These are all name brand pieces of equipment like GE, Puritan-Bennet, Drager, Ohmeda, Stryker, and Hill Rom.

We have been frugal with our medical equipment purchases all these years. Even so, we couldn't have done it without your donations, and we will continue to be good stewards of your generosity. Thank you!

Update on COVID-19 in Ecuador



There is still very significant transmission of COVID-19 in Ecuador. That is based more on hospital bed occupancy than on any epidemiologic testing, which is essentially non-existent. Even hospital bed occupancy is not a publicly known number. Rather it is anecdotal through our relationships with physicians and nurses working at government hospitals.

We also know that the Delta variant is widely transmitted here, likely explaining the ongoing significant hospital bed occupancy.

Vaccines are now finally available here. The most prevalent one is the Chinese Sinovac vaccine. But there is also AstraZeneca and Pfizer to a lesser extent. The government has adopted a strategy of allowing medium to large businesses access to the vaccine after providing the government with a list of names of employees and their family members. The government has also partnered with several public and private universities to improve distribution. These measures have led to the vaccination of approximately 10% of the population.

Interestingly, surveys indicate that only about onethird of Ecuadorians desire to be vaccinated at this point. This likely represents a lack of trust in the formal healthcare system, in addition to reasons given in other countries.


AHD will only begin administering COVID-19 vaccines if asked to do so by the public Ministry of Health. So far that has not occurred, but our staff continues to work on the frontlines of the pandemic to provide care and education to affected families.
